**November 14** - Codebreakers Part 2 Chuck Gross will give a more in depth look at the codebreakers: Women contributors, American Indians, famous mathematicians and engineers, and some who nearly derailed Allied abilities. He will talk about the Japanese abilities, along with critical decryption achievements in the Pacific war. What did a tiny town in rural Indiana have to do with all this?
